Walk With Me raises more than \$135,000 for children with disabilities

Nearly 1,000 people helped make annual event a success

Each year, more than one million young children across the nation that are at risk for developmental delays or disabilities fail to get the services and support they need. Easter Seals Southwest Human Development's annual Walk With Me fundraising event is supported by the community in an effort to change that devastating statistic.

The fifth annual Walk With Me was held on Saturday,

May 4 at Steele Indian School Park in Phoenix. Sponsored locally by Humana, Wells Fargo, Willis of Arizona, MassMutual of Arizona. Delta Dental of Arizona, Discount School Supply, Squire Sanders and the Fennemore Craig Foundation, with national support from CVS Caremark, Century 21, Amway and MassMutual, the event featured music, food and drink, fun activities for kids and access to a variety of community resources.

With the support of FOX 10 and my45, News/Talk 92.3 KTAR and 98.7 The Peak, along with Raising Arizona Kids Magazine, almost 1,000 people came together for Walk With Me 2013 and raised more than \$135,000 to benefit Easter Seals Southwest Human Development and the many services offered to young children with disabilities throughout central and northern Arizona.

Meet Maggie

When Maggie was born, her parents, Lissette and Stephen Lent, quickly realized that she had

physical challenges – such as difficulty feeding and vision impairment – but the cause was unknown. Without a diagnosis, her parents went in search of help.


Lissette and Stephen soon discovered the Children's Developmental Center at Southwest Human Development, where a team of pediatric specialists completed a full assessment of Maggie's needs. Shortly thereafter, a physical and occupation-

> al therapist were assigned to work with Maggie on a weekly basis.

Eventually, Maggie was diagnosed with a chromosome disorder called Mosaic Trisomy 8, better known as T8M. This rare disorder affects Maggie's physical development, which makes tasks such as walking and eating difficult, as well as causing heart complications.

Maggie hasn't allowed any of this to slow her down, she loves to dance and listen to music. She recently underwent three

major surgeries to help her become stronger and after being in wheelchairs and walkers, she can now walk independently. And, after two years of using a feeding tube, Maggie can now eat on her own.



Southwest Human Development's Children's Developmental Center opened its doors in 2011 to become the state's first comprehensive facility serving Arizona's young children, specifically ages birth to five, who have or are thought to have

Supporting a successful transition for fragile infants and their families from the NICU back to their community

The overall purpose of the Smooth Way Home Fragile Infant Project is to improve the social, developmental and medical outcomes of very fragile infants by enhancing the coordination of care and the quality of services provided to them as they transition from the newborn intensive care unit back to their home and community.

Southwest Human Development has played a leadership role in bringing together a wide range of community partners, including state agencies, community service providers, parent advocacy groups, hospital personnel, physicians and health insurance providers to address the needs of this very vulnerable population.

collected more than 11,000 books for the agency's Reach Out and Read program.

Southwest Human Development's Raising A Reader program was also featured during a televised early childhood literacy summit at the Herberger Theater in downtown Phoenix.

complex developmental delays, disabilities or behavioral challenges.

When parents are worried about their child's development or behavior, they often find themselves going from one specialist to another looking for assistance. The Children's Developmental Center was designed to avoid this frustrating process by providing families with a team of early childhood professionals who can provide comprehensive assessment, diagnosis and treatment to ensure young children receive the best integrated medical, developmental and mental health care possible.

With the help of Virginia G. Piper Charitable Trust and the addition of Dr. Daniel B. Kessler as the center's medical director, the Children's Developmental Center quickly became one of the Valley's greatest resources for families with services including a Feeding Program for young children with eating difficulties, early intervention and treatment, as well as programs for children with disabilities such as autism and cerebral palsy.

A key component of the Children's Developmental Center is the importance the team places on working in partnership with families to understand each child's individual needs and, in tandem, developing a comprehensive plan that supports the family's home and community life. Additionally, the center also focuses on care coordination to ensure the results of the evaluation and treatment recommendations are fully understood by the family and other child care or health care providers involved in the child's daily life.
