Thunderbirds Charities gifts \$100,000 to ADAPT Shop

Expands disabilities services, opens family resource center

Each year, more than 2,000 children in Arizona under the age of 1 are expected to be diagnosed with a developmentally-limiting condition like cerebral palsy or spinal muscular atrophy.

Thanks to a \$100,000 grant from Thunderbirds Charities, more of Arizona's young children with these types of severe disabilities will be able to receive the support they need at Southwest Human Development's ADAPT Shop.



The ADAPT Shop is a unique facility where parents can bring their young children with disabilities to receive customized products and support devices. A physical therapist works with each family in their home or at the ADAPT Shop to determine what equipment would be most helpful – such as custom foam seating and mobile scooters – and products are then designed and built based on the child's individual needs.

"We are so grateful for the generous support of Thunderbirds Charities," said Ginger Ward, CEO of Southwest Human Development. "This commitment helps us continue providing this incredible and much-needed resource for Arizona's young children and families, expand the ADAPT Shop's work space and create an on-site family resource center."

Children who can benefit from the ADAPT Shop

include those with cerebral palsy, spinal muscular atrophy, Down syndrome, seizure disorders and a variety of other conditions.

"The ADAPT Shop has opened up our world to possibilities that we weren't able to see and we've been able to do things that we weren't able to do before," said Heather Magdelano, a mother of two who both have a rare disorder that impacts their sight, hearing and muscle development. "They're now able to sit upright and

interact with others thanks to the ADAPT Shop's support and their vision."

Since opening in 2011, the ADAPT Shop has helped more than 300 young children who have disabilities that keep them from being able to fully participate in everyday activities at home, with their friends and at school.

"As Thunderbirds, we work hard all year planning and executing the Waste Management Phoenix Open," said Thunderbirds Big Chief Tom Altieri. "The real satisfaction, though, comes from the ability to give back to so many great

organizations such as Southwest Human Development for their ADAPT Shop. It makes everything we do feel so worthwhile."

Ensuring families are linked to home visitation services that best meet their needs



Building Strong Families From the Start

Parent Partners Plus is an alliance of eight partner agencies that ensures families are linked with the most appropriate home visitation program that best meets their unique needs.

Funded by First Things First, Parent Partners Plus connects families to free home visitation programs in Phoenix, Laveen and Maryvale. These programs help families with young children by providing individualized parenting support, developmental screenings, parent-child activities and access to additional community

resources from pregnancy through the age of 5.

When families call the Parent Partners Plus referral line, they are connected with programs such as Early Head Start, Fussy Baby, Healthy Families, Healthy Start, Newborn Intensive Care Program, Nurse-Family Partnership and Parents as Teachers.

With Parent Partners Plus acting as a single point of entry, the process of families accessing and receiving these much-needed services is both simplified and coordinated. Since its launch in 2012, this inter-program cooperation has proven successful to meet the needs of families in the community and improve outcomes for young children.

APS backpacks help Kinship Care and Adoptions children

Grant provides "Welcome Home" supplies during difficult transitions

Many children who are served by Southwest Human Development's Kinship Care and Adoptions Program have only a few personal belongings when they arrive at their new homes. During this transition, children often arrive with only the clothes they are wearing.

Thanks to a \$5,000 grant from Arizona Public Service, or APS, these children now have a few extra things to call their own that also offer comfort and support to ease this difficult transition.

The APS "Welcome Home" backpacks include stuffed animals, blankets, pillows, flashlights or nightlights, journals or children's books, photo albums or picture frames, board or card games, and a gift card for groceries and personal hygiene items

Southwest Human Development's Kinship Care and Adoptions Program supports children who have been removed from their parents' homes and, in many cases, have suffered from child abuse and neglect. The program guides their families or caregivers – sometimes grandparents, aunts or uncles, foster parents and others – by facilitating kinship care home studies, foster care licensing, adoption certifications and placement supervision.

The State of Arizona offers up to a \$400 tax credit to people who support qualifying charitable organizations like Southwest Human Development.
